
The following article comes from the Kern Antelope Historical Society publication: Gold-Fever - 40 Years Digging Antelope Valley History by Glen Settle. Glen's wife, Dorene, also helped in the writing and compilation of the book. Of course Glen and Dorene are on the list as charter members of the Kern Antelope Historical Society as of May, 1959. Glen became the first president of the Society and served from May of 1959 through December, 1962. Later, Dorene serve several terms as well.

Chapter 1 of Part II deals with the organization of the Kern Antelope Historical Society and the development of the Tropico Museum. The next chapter, shared here, talks about one of the important relics that was collected and, eventually, put on a portable display with wheels so it could be exhibited throughout the Antelope Valley.

## Part II - Chapter 2 Museum and Garces Rock

When the Settles had completed the move of seventeen historic buildings in their gold camp they asked the Kern Antelope Historical Society if they would like to convert one of the buildings into a museum. The society was interested and "Doc" Lowry and Clarence Gerblick volunteered to get the old building ready for a museum. They picked the old Munz house from Leona Valley. John Munz originally moved this old building from where Plant 42 is now located.

When the museum was dedicated the Munz family and many pioneer families were in attendance. Members gathered relics and antiques of Antelope Valley history, which were





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on display. The main feature of the museum was the Garces Rock, which was considered to be the Antelope Valley's "Plymouth Rock".

"Cura Garces Rock"

In the Spring of 1776 Father Francisco Garces, on an exploratory trip became the first recorded white man to travel down and across the Antelope Valley. He followed an Indian trail, accompanied and guided by several Indians, enroute to the San Joaquin Valley. On his return he is believed to have traveled north of present Mojave toward the Mojave river near present Barstow.

The K.A.H.S. possesses a bolder [sic] inscribed "CURA GARCES—ABRIL 1776" and a cross, which was found northeast of Mojave, the history of the find of the Garces rock follows.

**1935**: Mike Sanchez was told about the rock by an old desert prospector who had found it many years earlier.

**March 1963**: Miss Jane M. Offt, a teacher in Lancaster Elementary School, told Glen A. Settle, of the Kern Antelope Historical Society about the rock while he was giving a history program to her class. Miss Offt had been told about the rock by one of her pupils, whose father was Mike Sanchez.


**April 1965**: K.A.H.S. members, Mr. and Mrs. Paul Deaver, Mr. and Mrs. Rudy Schwandt and Mr. and Mrs. Glen Settle (with a map from Miss Offt), located the rock and took photos. The K.A.H.S. was alerted, and it was decided (due to the fact that vandals had already done some damage to the rock) it should be moved to a place where it would have protection.

Arrangements for moving the rock were made with Mr. Louis Zeravica, who had an "A" frame truck and was interested in Antelope Valley history. He, along with Society members Paul Deaver, Rudy Schwandt, Glen A. Settle and Sgts, M. Butler, H. Stiely and B. Kittrell, went to the site and with great difficulty and care loaded the rock and moved it to the Kern Antelope Historical Society Museum in Tropico Gold Camp where it has since remained.

Mr. Charles LaMonk, well known Antelope Valley Indian Rock Art artist and expert, and others, have examined the rock and believe that the patina of the carving is very old and could very well date back to the time of Garces' crossing of Antelope Valley.

Later, while on a visit to Tropico, Reverend F. Noel Moholy, O.F.M., a member of the California State Historical Resources Commission, and considered an outstanding authority of early California-Spanish history, examined the rock. He stated the use of "Cura" and the "Cross" were [sic] appropriate and authentic in relation to Garces and the period.

**1976**: Bicentennial of the U.S. and 200<sup>th</sup> anniversary of Father Garces' journey through the Antelope Valley.





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**January 1976**: The Kern Antelope Historical Society began to make arrangements for a more portable unit to display the rock and thus enable public appearances at various places throughout the Antelope Valley.

**March 1976**: Guthrie Collins and Claude Selfield, society members, prepared a display unit for the Garces Rock. Tropico Goldcamp provided wheels for the unit. Using a fork lift truck of Guthrie Collins, it was hauled to Lancaster and mounted on the traveling display unit. Rudy Schwandt and Grace Pickus arranged for display sites. Now more A.V. residents and school children will be able to see the historic artifact.

In 1980, when Tropico Gold Camp closed, the Garces rock and several items from the Kern Antelope Historical Society Museum were loaned to the Eastern California Museum in California City. Then a certain happening occurred. The museum caught fire and when the roof collapsed down upon the rock, the fire Department shot many streams of cold water into the building and the Rock just seemed to shatter and went into hundreds of pieces. The museum items on loan from K.A.H.S. were also destroyed in the fire. Some of the articles donated to the K.A.H.S. Museum were returned to the original donor. Many of the articles left were donated to the Tehachapi Museum.

## The Rest of the Story

So . . . was that the end of the story? Was there *anything,* at all, left of the Garces Rock? Well, if you've been to the Antelope Valley Rural Museum, you might know the answer. If not, you will want to join us on Thursday, June 9th to discover the answer and other interesting things!

#### Directions:

- Turn off the **14 Freeway at Ave. H** and go past the main entrance to **Gate #3**, west of the Watch and Wager Bldg.
- **Go north, along west side of fairgrounds to the 4th building** (counting the newest building) to the the Farm and Garden building.
- Farm & Garden x AV Fair & Event Center WAvenue H Gate #3
- Park along the drive, on the 'back' (or west) side of the building.
