Our special speaker for February will be our own Gretchen Winfrey who has served as President of the Kern Antelope Historical Society for a number years. She will be sharing "A Peek at the Schools of the Rosamond Area". She has accumulated a lot of materials from various sources. But more than that, she has had extensive experience with the Southern Kern Unified School District. She was hired by Superintendent Lawson in 1962 and served in various capacities in the district, including teaching at the high school, for many years. Following is an excerpt from the September, 2019 issue of the Antelope Horn, giving a little background on Gretchen.



Gretchen Winfrey was born in Holtville, California, a small town near El Centro, in 1939. Eventually the family moved to the Ventura area when her dad started his own welding supply business. Education was important in her family and she

attended San Jose State after high school. (An early example of this family value was when the young man, who would become her father, quit high school and went to work in the fields, his future mother-in-law marched herself out in the field and told him to 'get back in school!' and he did!). She signed up as a counselor but when a Group Leader had to be replaced, she moved up into that position. The girls were city kids from Oakland and she found that she "loved working with those kids" and changed her major from Chemistry to Education.



When her college days were done and it came time to look for a job, her first choice fell through and she had to scramble to get something else. Looking within a hundred mile radius of her home in Ventura, she found there was a job available in Rosamond! And 'the rest is history' as they say. And that would be Rosamond's gain.

A Peek at the Schools of the Rosamond Area

Almost all of us have had some kind of involvement with schools in this area. You may have attended them, worked at them, sent your kids to them, and attended cultural and sports events and many other kinds of activities at the schools. For many of the 'oldtimers', you might remember the field trips such as the wonderful overnight Catalina trip for the Eighth Grade class, the Second Grade (I think?) riding the train to Bakersfield and going over the Loop, and the First Grade trip to the zoo, to name a few. You might remember many of the teachers you had,

or the bus drivers and cafeteria workers who helped you get to school and make it through the day. Remember the school Halloween carnivals and parades, the back-to-school nights, Christmas programs, and so on. The buildings and school sites have grown and changed too. At one time, kids had to attend Southern Kern classes at local churches before the school got new campuses built in the mid to late 50's. There was also the Willow Springs school, of which barely anything remains. Did you attend any of the original Rosamond area schools which are no longer standing?

Come out and join us on February 9th for a "Peek" at the history of Rosamond area schools. And we want your input. Bring your memories, photos, old yearbooks, or any other souvenirs of your involvement with this important part of our 'story'. Did you know there was a basement at one time at Rosamond Elementary? Do you know what young teacher, who was later a principle, rode to school on the bus with the kids because she didn't yet have a car? And what teacher loaded up her class and took them to visit

her little farm and served orange juice to the kids sitting on the lawn? Did you sell magazine subscriptions or Christmas trees to help pay for your 8th grade Catalina trip? Who worked on the booths or other parts of the arena, getting it ready for Little Britches rodeos, community fairs, etc.?



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Valentine's Day - "Origin Vague at Best"

Valentine's Day, also called St. Valentine's Day, is a holiday (February 14) when lovers express their affection with greetings and gifts. Given their similarities, it has been suggested that the holiday has origins in the Roman festival of Lupercalia, held in mid-February. The festival, which celebrated the coming of spring, included fertility rites and the pairing off of women with men by lottery. At the end of the 5th century, Pope Gelasius I forbid the celebration of Lupercalia and is sometimes attributed with replacing it with St. Valentine's Day, but the true origin of the holiday is vague at best. Valentine's Day did not come to be celebrated as a day of romance until about the 14th century.

Although there were several Christian martyrs named Valentine, the day may have taken its name from a priest who was martyred about 270 AD by the emperor Claudius II Gothicus. According to legend, the priest signed a letter "from your Valentine" to his jailer's daughter, whom he had befriended and, by some accounts, healed from blindness. Other accounts hold that it was St. Valentine of Terni, a bishop, for whom the holiday was named, though it is possible the two saints were actually one person. Another common legend states that St. Valentine defied the emperor's orders and secretly married couples to spare the husbands from war. It is for this reason that his feast day is associated with love.

The World's Oldest Valentine's Day Card

The earliest surviving romantic Valentine missive . . . has French origins. It was written by Charles, Duke of Orleans while he was imprisoned in the Tower of London, after being captured by the English during the Battle of Agincourt in 1415. Written to his wife Bonne of Armagnac, the love poem repeats phrases using "Valentine" as a term of endearment several times:

Je suis desja d'amour tanné, Ma tres doulce Valentinée This French prose translates to "I am already sick of love, My very gentle Valentine" in English. Sadly, the Dukés wife died before receiving the words of love of her

imprisoned husband and today his words reside in the British Library.

Also found in the British Library is the earliest known English language example of a Valentine. Dating to February 1477, the love letter was written by Margery Brews to her fiancé John Paston. Margery refers to John as her "right well-beloved Valentine" and beseeches him to marry her despite the fact she hasn't been able to convince her father to increase her dowry. (Romance in the 15th century was as much about practical matters as it was about passion.) Good news, romantics – the couple did go on to marry. https://www.scrapbook.com/articles/valentine-history
