- Historical Interview: Cecil Burton "A Look Back--Rosamond and Water" recorded by Jed Dyke in 2001

We have an interesting piece of southern Kern history to present at our April meeting. **Cecil Burton** is part of the historic Burton Family who operated the Tropico Mine and Mill and had such an influence on the community of Rosamond. For those who knew Cecil, it was like visiting or walking around with a living history book. He could tell so many things from everyday life about the area years ago. The interview we have was done by Jed Dyke in 2001, before Cecil moved out of the area. Cecil passed away in 2011.



"Alec Cecil Burton was born March 2, 1926 in Vancouver, Canada the son of Alec and Margaret Burton. He passed away in Prescott, AZ on Feb. 10 2011.

Cecil graduated from AVJUHS on May 26, 1944 and on May 27 he was on a train bound for Ft. MacArthur



where he was inducted into the U.S.Army. He was proud of his service during the war, assigned to the 71st Inf. Div., 66th Inf. Reg., 3rd Batt., Co. "M." Cecil's job assignment was in the 81 MM Mortar Platoon as a mortar man. While in Europe he would travel over 800 actual combat miles out of the over 2,000 miles he travelled with the 7th and 3rd Army. With eight river assaults, the 66th penetrated farther east than any other U.S. combat unit. The(y) accepted the surrender of the Germans on May 7, 1945, and

liberated several concentration camps in Austria. Cecil was assigned to the Army of Occupation after the war ended, then to rest and rehabilitation camp. He was honorably discharged with the rank of private, first class after two years in the army. He received many medals including the

Bronze Star – Rhineland Campaign and a letter of commendation from General Eisenhower.

After the war, Cecil worked at the Tropico Gold Mine in Rosamond. He was a reserve deputy sheriff in Kern Co. and worked at EAFB employed with the Civil Service in jet engine test and development for the Air Force. He earned a teaching credential from UCLA and taught mining and assaying classes at AVJC." https://www.findagrave.com/memorial/65683696/alec-cecil-burton





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Cecil's son, Terry, shared this background information on his dad.

"Alex Cecil Burton commonly called Cecil Burton arrived in the area as a child when his father was asked by his father's brothers to come help build housing at the Gold Camp at the base of Tropico mine. When Cecil was old enough, he worked in the mine until it closed and then worked at Edwards Air Force Base, first as a laborer and then, after being trained, as a jet engine mechanic. He retired from that job in the mid to late 1970's and started doing some prospecting at both old and new claims and worked a mine on Soledad Mountain. with his son. He also worked as an assayer and rebuilt and ran the mill at Tropico until it closed in 1992."

From the KAHS book Gold-Fever, 40 Years Digging Antelope Valley History, comes this information on Cecil's grandfather, William and family.

Cecil's father, Alec, was one of four brothers. Their father William moved the whole family from England to the Antelope Valley in 1900. William Burton, who had been a successful shop owner before leaving South-End-On-Sea, arrived, with his wife Millicent and sons, Sydney, Clifford, Cecil and Alec, by train in Lancaster, then went by horse and buggy to the ranch he had purchased (sight-unseen) north of Ave I, near 60th Street West in the Esperanza district. Sadly, his

wife, who was not in good health, passed away within the first year of coming to America.

A fun story is told about the boys' first day of school at Del Sur. They wore their velvet and lace and were teased

mercilessly, and refused to go back until they got clothes like the other kids, which was soon accomplished. Also, they could afford store-bought cookies which they would trade for good sandwiches of homemade bread, and cake and pie.

Eventually, after World War I, two of the brothers, H. Clifford and Cecil F. Burton, became partners in operating the Tropico Gold Mine and Mill and the Burton Bros. In 1928 the brothers incorporated. Alec Cecil Burton, the youngest brother had moved to Canada and, as mentioned above, moved his family back to Rosamond to work for his brothers.

Personal Recollection of Cecil by Rae and Janet Winters.

Rae Winters recalled that Cecil (son of Alec Cecil) said he worked on every engine the Air Force used in his many years at Edwards AFB. Cecil also introduced us to the old townsite of Domino in Kern County, at 170th W. Cecil said that when he and his friends were out riding horses they would stop for a soda in the small community on their way home. Cecil also recalled riding horseback, maybe out to help round up cattle or something and the grass was growing clear up to the stirrups - that's pretty tall. It's a little easier to picture in a year like we're having now with so much rain. Things were definitely different back then.

Cecil's dad also told him about getting water for the Burton Ranch at 60th St., years earlier. They just drove a six inch pipe in the ground about nine feet down, leaving a couple feet above the ground and water flowed out to help irrigate their crops.

Another time Cecil recalled when he and his dad, Alec, were working on fencing in the pasture on their ranch just south of Tropico and they both felt and heard an earthquake. It was very small but they felt the ground roll up and down beneath their feet as they stood there.

Cecil shared about working on the Chet Scott Ranch at 190th St West just north of Ave D. His job was to cut juniper branches to use for fence posts for the barbed wire to hold Chet's cattle on his land. (This was the subject of an article in the June, 2021, *Antelope Horn*.) Some of those fence posts are still out there!

One last story - Cecil shared this from his time in the war. He and another soldier were forward spotters for artillery. One day they asked the captain why they were sent out more than other spotters and the answer was "You guys always come back." Cecil said they were "Indian-like" in their scouting, unlike a lot of city boys.
