Rawley and his wife were well respected and involved in many civic organizations throughout the Antelope Valley area.

Rawley Duntley - Kern County Cowboy, Rancher, and Barbecue King

"Shucks, if a feller can't be neighborly, what's the use of livin" RBD

Rawley Bruce Duntley was born in Iowa in 1883, and as a young boy traveled with his parents to California. They eventually settled in the Antelope Valley area where the young man gained valuable experience in the stock raising industry. In 1905, Rawley married his Lancaster sweetheart, Ina May Doyle. In 1910, the couple moved up to Oak Creek Canyon in the Tehachapi Mountains, and established their own ranch that would grow to 9,000 acres.

It was in this beautiful mountain setting where they would raise their children and reside for 44 years. During this time, the popular and well respected couple became quite involved in many civic organizations, hospital boards, school districts, etc., in Mojave, Tehachapi, Rosamond, and Lancaster. Ina May also served as President of the Native Daughters of the Golden West.


As a young cowboy, Rawley learned the art of Deep-Pit BBQ from the Native Americans in the area.

He used these skills for over 50 years, hosting, traveling, and preparing for some of the biggest cookouts in Southern California. It wasn't unusual for him to serve up over 2-4,000 lbs of beef at an event. He hosted celebrities, politicians, and dignitaries of all kinds. In the early years of the "space age", several NASA officials from Edwards AFB traveled to his ranch for one of his special gatherings.

During the Depression of the 1930's, many miners and their families in the Mojave area were suffering greatly. Rawley saw to it that they didn't go hungry, providing his own cattle to keep them fed at times. His hundreds of BBQ's provided funds for countless organizations from Bakersfield to LA: churches, Little Leagues, P.T.A.'s, and many others. It was well known that he never received a dime for his efforts.

So appreciated were his contributions to the Antelope Valley, that a park in Lancaster was named in his honor, the Rawley Duntley Park.

In 1960, a magazine reporter doing a story on him brought up some of the selfless stories she had heard. Rawley's humble response was "Shucks, if a feller can't be neighborly, what's the use of livin'?"



Veterans Day?

Veterans Day is Saturday, November 11, the date in 1918 that Germany and the Allies signed an agreement to end hostilities in World War I. Since the holiday is on Saturday, Veterans Day will be observed on Friday, Nov. 10, according to the Department of Veterans Affairs.

Federal government closings are established by the U.S. Office of Personnel Management (OPM). Generally, when a holiday falls on a non-workday — Saturday or Sunday — the federal government is closed on Monday (if the holiday falls on Sunday) or Friday (if the holiday falls on Saturday).


Veterans Day has been around for a long time, but it first started out as Armistice Day. U.S. President Woodrow Wilson proclaimed Nov. 11, 1919, to be Armistice Day to honor members of the armed forces who were killed during World War I. The date commemorates the armistice signed between the Allies of World War I and Germany at Compiègne, France.



It was in 1954, after World War II and after the Korean Conflict, that Congress amended the Act of 1938 by striking out the word "Armistice" and inserting in its place the word "Veterans". On June 1, 1954, November 11th became a day to honor American veterans of all wars. On October 8, 1954, the first Veterans Day Proclamation was issued by President Dwight D. Eisenhower, according to the Department of Veterans Affairs.




